

## Camp Fellowship- 2020 COVID-19 Health Procedures

In consideration of Covid-19 and our desire to keep you and your family safe, we are implementing minimum standard protocols for Camp Fellowship this summer.

To start, we are limiting participation to 100 students (those who have graduated Kindergarten through 4th Grade in 2020). They will be divided into groups of 10 or less, with two leaders per group.

Volunteers and staff will closely monitor students throughout the camp. However, we need your help.

Below are expectations for participants, families, and volunteers. These expectations are consistent with the Governors Standard Health Protocols as outlined on May 18, 2020.

### Checklist for Camp Participants

-At home, upon arrival at camp, and at least daily while at camp, each student should be screened for any of the following symptoms of COVID-19:


- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Chills
- Repeated shaking with chills
- Muscle pain
- Headache
- Sore throat
- Loss of taste or smell
- Diarrhea

-If a student has had close contact with a person who has COVID-19 within the 14 days prior to camp fellowship, they may not attend camp!

- All students must wash or sanitize their hands at regular intervals, including before and after every meal and activity.
- Although not required, students should consider wearing face coverings (over the nose and mouth) when at camp.
- When camp concludes, students should minimize in-person contact with any person 65 years of age or older, especially those with pre-existing health conditions, for a period of 14 days.

### Checklist for Parents or Guardians

- Each day, screen your child for COVID-19 symptoms before coming to camp. If they are symptomatic, please do not bring them to camp.
- If your child demonstrates any COVID-19 symptoms while at camp, you will need to promptly pick them up. Students confirmed to have COVID-19 will not be able to return to camp.
- If anyone tests positive for COVID-19, all parents/guardians will be notified. You may decide to either remove your child from the camp or leave them in camp and trust the volunteers/staff to take appropriate safeguards.
- You may not visit the camp during camp sessions, except to drop-off and pick-up your student.
- Please maintain a separation of at least 6 feet from individuals not within your household during drop-off and pick-up.
- We will have a drop off/pick up system for you
- Please remain in your vehicle at camper drop-off and pick-up, if possible.
- Please be aware of the enhanced risks of camp participants being in direct contact with anyone age 65 or older for 14 days after camp concludes



### Checklist for Volunteers/Staff

- We will separate campers and staff into groups or cohorts that remain consistent over during the camp session.
- Each morning we will screen volunteers to make sure they are not demonstrating any COVID-19 symptoms. If anyone does exhibit symptoms, they will be sent home and the parents/guardians of campers in their group will be notified. This does NOT indicate a positive test for COVID-19, but rather that precautions were taken.
- If a staff member tests positive for COVID-19, the staff member will immediately leave the camp.
- If anyone tests positive for COVID-19, all parents/guardians will be notified. The parents/guardians may decide to either remove their child from the camp or leave the child in the camp and trust the volunteers/staff to take appropriate safeguards.
- Groups containing an individual who tested positive for COVID-19 will be isolated from other groups for duration of the session.
- We will develop, train, and implement increased daily sanitation protocols for common surfaces, restrooms, recreational equipment, and other used facilities. This includes having dedicated cleaning/sanitation stations available as well as a dedicated team cleaning our bathroom facilities every 30 minutes.
- We will have an individual dedicated to ensuring the safety and health protocols are being successfully implemented and followed.
- We will ensure access to on-site medical personnel, or an on-call physician, for the duration of the a camp.
- Although not required, volunteers and staff should consider wearing face coverings (over thee nose and mouth) when at camp.
